

MRS PAIGE CLASSROOM LEARNING

WEEKS 5 TO 10 TERM 4

For the past 6 weeks students have been learning all about money. In the early years, students have learnt to recognise the value of coins and notes and have been calculating different amounts. The middle years have been adding prices from menus in order to calculate change. Students have learnt various strategies to help calculate the correct change.





We have also been busy creating and choreographing a dance. Leanne from Dima Dance came to teach us some fun dance skills and together we created a Ghostbusters dance.



Students used what Leanne had taught them to then plan, rehearse and perform their own dance which you will see at our end of year celebration on Thursday. Everyone enjoyed working together and performing in front of their peers. We look forward to sharing our learning with you at our celebration morning.







Teachers Report

As my first year is coming to an end, I have to tell you what a pleasure working with Homestead students and staff it has been. As you know our enrolments grew by 200 % in one term which really changed the dynamics in the classroom, mainly for the teachers...the kids loved it!

In English, we have been looking at Australian poetry. We examined the language features that make a poem a poem like heat and feet, rhyming and alliteration eg. 'Dusty Desert Dune'. We read poems about Barry the Camel and In the desert. Part of our unit was to write an adaptation of a poem to a new setting. The year 4's wrote about their local community and described where they live in a structured poem which had ryming and alliteration. They then had to perform it in front of their peers. With lots of practice, we did a great job using eye contact and varying our voice to keep the audience interest. And they did!

In maths, the year 4's focused on equivalent fractions and decimals. This was tricky at first, as fractions always are, and then to find equivalent fractions! We also did a unit on money. This starts with recognising the coins and notes and the value of each. The year 4's had to solve purchasing problems of a trip to the pizza shop with the family. They had to work out how much they needed and how much change they should get. It involved fluently counting amounts and working with multi-step solutions. We use these skills in the morning before school, where we take orders for drinks and food with toy fruit and money. A great way to start the day.

OOOOBLECK! Ask our students what that is because that word gets used EVERY week. It was the start of our science unit where we investigated properties of different items. Making oobleck was our first experiment, made from corn flour and water. The photos tell you how much fun that was. Our main investigation was to find binders that affect the use of orchre mainly being used by First Nations and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Here, the students had to make predictions of what would combining ochre with water, cooking oil, egg yolk and PVA glue do. Then we used our fingers to smudge it down paper. That meant putting our fingers into some pretty gooey stuff....all in the name of science of course! When it dried we observed how it smudged, and if it was water resistant. We analysed our data and applied this knowledge to real life situations, like what would be best to use as body paint or on a shield. Apart from the word oobleck the word opaque (can't see through) is also embedded into the student's vocabulary, which is a great thing about science.
